Academic year	The academic year is divided into two semesters, autumn and spring, each semester lasting thirteen weeks. The academic calendar varies somewhat from one faculty to another, http://english.hi.is/university/academic_calendar	
Expected date of arrival	Students should aim to arrive around 20 August for the Autumn semester and in the first week of January for the Spring semester. The beginning of the semester varies between faculties but exact dates are in the Academic calendar. It is recommended that students arrive a week prior to the beginning of the semester and at the latest in time to attend the orientation meeting.	
	All exchange students are required to arrive in time for the start of the semester and to attend the orientation week.

Programmes closed to exchange students	 The faculties of Medicine, Nursing and Pharmaceutical Sciences are restricted to prior agreements between the exchanging faculties. The faculties of Law and Economics do not accept undergraduate students. MBA is closed Courses in the English Language Programme are only available to exchange students majoring in English at their home university or students who are very proficient in English (except the course "English for Practical Purposes"). Courses taught in Icelandic are generally not open to exchange students, (except Nordic students and students who are fluent in Icelandic and can speak, write and understand Icelandic).

Credits and grading system	60 ECTS credits amount to one year of full-time study and 30 ECTS credits constitute one term's full-time study. Further information on credits and grading system: http://english.hi.is/university/credit_system_and_grades	
Language of Instruction	The principal language of instruction at the University is Icelandic. Most faculties offer some courses in English, as well as full graduate programmes taught entirely in English. http://english.hi.is/university/courses_english	
Language	Applicants from countries outside the EU/EEA whose native language is not English,	

proficiency	need to prove their English proficiency by submitting TOEFL or IELTS scores. The minimum TOEFL score is 79, and IELTS is 6.5. This is to make sure students do not have problems during their exchange period as they cannot expect any special assistance due to language problems. A self-assessment of English proficiency is included in the student application.	
Icelandic language courses	The Faculty of Icelandic and Comparative Cultural Studies offers a full degree programme in Icelandic for international students.

Orientation	An orientation week for all international students is held at the beginning of each semester where the practicalities and services at the University are introduced. Various events are available to students during the first week of the semester, among others a guided tour on campus, concerts, lectures etc. Please note: Students are required to attend the welcome reception.	
Student residence permit	All international students must meet the requirements set by either the Directorate of Immigration or Registers Iceland depending on their citizenship.	
	Citizens of countries outside the EU/EEA must obtain a student permit before entering Iceland. Applications are submitted directly to the Directorate of Immigration and the application deadline is 1 July for the Autumn semester and 1 November for the Spring semester.

	EU/EEA citizens (including Nordic citizens) staying for <u>one</u> semester only do not need to register the change of their address and can go straight to the Service desk at the University Center.	
	EU/EEA citizens staying for more than one semester (including Nordic citizens) must go straight to the Registers Iceland (Borgarún 21, 105 Reykjavík, open from 9 -15 all weekdays) and fill in the appropriate from and hand in required documents http://english.hi.is/university/before arrival At the end of the registration process you will be allocated an Icelandic ID number (kennitala). When your ID number is ready and you have paid the registration fee (degree seeking students) you can get a username and password to register into the intranet Ugla. Please note it can take up to two weeks to issue the ID number. After you have applied you can check if your ID is ready at the Service Desk in the University Center.	
Health Issues	European citizens must bring the European Health Insurance Card (EHIC) and/or the insurance form E-104. This is proof that they are entitled to health insurance in	

	their home country. For further information or if in doubt, see the website of Icelandic Health Insurance, www.sjukra.is/english		
	Students from countries other than EU/EEA should have health insurance from an insurance company in their country that is licensed to operate in Iceland, or purchase medical insurance from an Icelandic insurance company valid for the first six months of their stay. The cost of such insurance is approximately ISK 15,000.		
	Applicants for a student residence permit coming from non-EEA European countries, Latin America, Asia or Africa must undergo a medical examination unless exempted. See further information at the Directorate of Health www.landlaeknir.is/english		
Mentor system	To help exchange students get a good start, the University of Iceland has a well-organised Mentor system. The main task of the Mentor is to provide the student with practical information about the University of Iceland and Icelandic society, as well as to introduce him/her to students and student life in general.
